Benton Harbor Wins FDL of the Year Award

GPO Names Michigan Library Among Best in the Nation

The U.S. Government Printing Office has selected Michigan's Benton Harbor Library as the 2006 Federal Depository Library of the Year. Public Printer Bruce James presented the award to library officials Sunday at the annual Federal Depository Libraries fall conference. In presenting the award, James commended the library for providing the residents of its community with online access to authentic published Government information.

"I am honored to present this award to the Benton Harbor Public Library. Our partnership with the Federal Depository Library is an example of how GPO and local libraries can help communities across the country access authentic published Government information," said James. "I am especially glad to see the library using the far-reaching benefits of the Web to post Federal Government documents that residents can download electronically."

Benton Harbor Public Library is in an economically challenged area and used limited funds to ensure Federal Government resources are used to their full potential. Michigan's United States Senators are proud of what a library in their home state was able to accomplish.

New Committee on the Status of Federal Libraries Meets

The newly constituted Committee on Legislation's Subcommittee on the Status of Federal Libraries met in late October in Washington, DC. Members of the subcommittee chaired by Jane Sess, included current and included several FAFLRT members as well as representatives from GODORT and other ALA divisions. The subcommittee will draft a plan of action for dealing with the many threats facing federal libraries and will report to ALA Council in Seattle in January. ALA has established a discussion list for the members. From time to time we will be posting to the FAFLRT list, so stay tuned.

Much of the initial focus of the subcommittee has been on the pressing situation of the closing and downsizing of many of the EPA regional libraries. There has been much attention paid to the sad state of the EPA library system in the press and Congress has begun to weigh in. Recently, four members of Congress sent a letter to the EPA administrator expressing their concern. The letter appears elsewhere in this issue. In Seattle, the subcommittee will meet Sunday morning at 10:30. Check the schedule for the location.

Dear Administrator Johnson:

We are writing to express our serious concerns over the current implementation of your plan to reorganize the library system of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). We understand that EPA is in the process of closing libraries and dispersing and destroying materials. Additionally, the General Services Administration is auctioning off library equipment. These actions are being undertaken in accordance with the budget request the President submitted for fiscal year 2007. Congress, however, has approved neither the President's 2007 budget request nor the library closure. We request that you maintain the status quo of the libraries and their materials while this issue is under investigation and review by Congress.

We also request that EPA brief our staffs and provide a written plan to Congress that includes the schedule and procedures that EPA intends to use to govern the disposition of documents, the consolidation of library services, and the transfer of paper and microfiche documents to electronic forms that will be publicly available. We further request that you ensure that Agency staff compile and maintain records of the location and content of all library material, including materials that have already been dispersed, to ensure it can be retrieved and used by Agency personnel and the public.

Over the past 36 years, EPA's libraries have accumulated a vast and invaluable trove of public health and environmental information, including at least 504,000 books and reports, 3,500 journal titles, 25,000 maps, and 3.6 million information objects on microfilm, according to the report issued in 2004: *Business Case for Information Services: EPA's Regional Libraries and Centers* prepared for the Agency by Stratus Consulting. Each one of EPA's libraries also had information experts who helped EPA staff and the public access and use the Agency's library collection and information held in other library collections outside of the Agency. It now appears that EPA officials are dismantling what is likely one of our country's most comprehensive and accessible collections of environmental materials.

The press has reported on the concerns over the library reorganization plan voiced by EPA professional staff of the Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance (OECA), 16 local union Presidents representing EPA employees, and the American Library Association. In response to our request of September 19, 2006, (attached), the Government Accountability Office has initiated an investigation of EPA's plan to close its libraries. Eighteen Senators sent a letter on November 3, 2006, to leaders of the Senate Appropriations Committee asking them to direct EPA "to restore and maintain public access and onsite library collections and services at EPA's headquarters, regional, laboratory and specialized program libraries while the Agency solicits and considers public input on its plan to drastically cut its library budget and services" (attached). Yet, despite the lack of Congressional approval and the concerns expressed over this plan, your Agency continues to move forward with dismantling the EPA libraries.

It is imperative that the valuable government information maintained by EPA's libraries be preserved. We ask that you please confirm in writing by no later than Monday, December 4, 2006, that the destruction or disposition of all library holdings immediately ceased upon the Agency's receipt of this letter and that all records of library holdings and dispersed materials are being maintained.





AIR FORCE LIBRARY UPDATE

Reorganizations, realignments, and system changes are ongoing challenges for the Air Force Library Program! The Presidents Budget Decision (PBD) 720, BRAC Joint Basing initiatives, NSPS, and many other reorganizations will impact Air Force library services. Funding has been realigned to meet the Air Force's major goals which include modernization of aircraft, meeting the requirements of the Government War on Terror (GWOT), and providing quality of life support for Airmen and their families. To accommodate these funding requirements, Air Force plans to reduce personnel (primarily military) as well as many base operating support contracts. This has significantly impacted contract and non-appropriated fund libraries; many have reduced the number of staff, materials budgets, and hours of operation.

The Elmendorf Base Library was recently approved for closure as part of the Joint Basing initiative (Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson). The Ft. Richardson Library is a new facility collocated with education and will provide responsive service to Air Force personnel and their families. One small special library, the Air Force Logistics



Library Learning Resource Center, Kirkuk AB

Management Agency Library at Gunter Annex, Maxwell AFB Alabama, was also identified for closure by Dec 06.

Despite these challenges, Air Force libraries continued to offer many programs and services to their military communities. Libraries have conducted special programs for families of deployed troops, such as "Operation Kudo" – setting up a mock tent-city for families to get the feel of a contingency environment. To support the Air Force Chief of Staff initiatives to expand lan-

guage abilities and cultural awareness for Airmen, several major commands and libraries purchased Rosetta Stone, a web-based language tutorial database. Offutt AFB library provided support to the new Language Learning Center (LLC), a centralized training area for language classes and the multimedia resources necessary to maintain their skill-level. The LLC brings all that and more to help Airmen maintain and enhance



their skills. Many Air Force libraries have updated technologies to include wireless Internet — just click 'n go for customers. (see photos)

The Air Force library program continues to provide paperback and periodical kits for over 250 remote sites and contingency operations. The Library Service Center (LSC) at Ramstein AB Germany also supports short-term contingency operations for Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom, as well as 9 branch libraries at Air Force sites in Europe located at a distance from any other library support. The library at Langley AFB Virginia procures on-line resources and other materials for Learning Resource Centers in Southwest Asia. Providing support to troops at the various contingency locations continues to be the top priority of the Air Force library program.

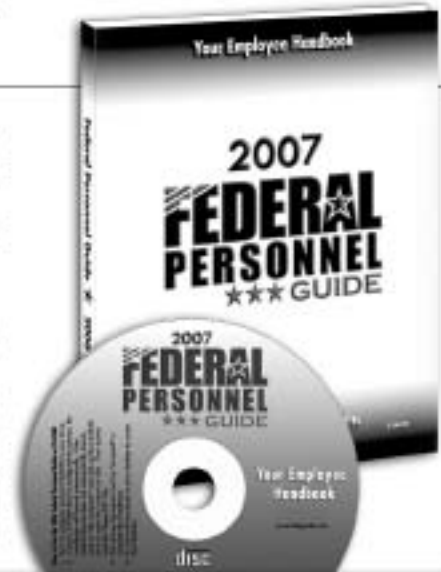
