He then entered politics and lost both legs when his plane crashed—perhaps not an accident—but he saved the others on board. Richard has long fought for wildlife conservation, still his passion. Today, his wife Meave and daughter Louise carry on the family search to fill gaps in human history.

In 1911, thousands of young women and young men labored long, grueling hours in the sweatshops of the garment district in New York City. One spring day, a fire broke out at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory. Although the fire lasted just 15 minutes, 146 young workers died. Most of these deaths could have been prevented and the public demanded to know how anyone could have let something like this happen.

The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire spurred many states and cities to pass antisweatshop laws and improve fire codes. The fire also made it very clear to workers that they needed a strong union. Today this event is remembered as the worst factory fire in New York City and one of the worst industrial disasters in American history.

Close your eyes and imagine a tropical island. No, not that one with the sandy beaches and the palm trees. This one is swampy, with a tangle of trees growing right out of the ocean. Watch your step! The trees’ roots poke out the ground and water in funny knobs and arches. On this island, even though the shade is deep, the air drips with heat and moisture. Mosquitoes swarm your sweaty face. Cicadas drone in the distance. Your nose wrinkles at the rotten-egg smell.

Welcome to a south-east Asian mangrove forest.

Day and night in the mangrove forest, the hunt is on to find food—and to avoid becoming someone else’s next meal. Here in the mangrove forest, many species of animals can live both in the water and on the ground. Monkeys swim. Fish walk on land. Ants stitch together homes high in the trees. Cloud leopards skulk in the shadows. In this book, *A Mangrove Forest Food Chain: A Who-eats-what Adventure in Asia*, you’ll meet many of them.

But this isn't a book you just pick up and read straight through. No, *you* pick the animal to start with. Then, after reading about it, *you* choose what it eats and flip to that animal's page. As you read and choose, you weave a route through the mangrove forest's food chain. But pay attention! You may end up back at the beginning. Or at a dead end. Food webs almost never go in straight lines.
