



Memorial Resolution Honoring Luisa Vigo-Cepeda

Whereas the American Library Association (ALA) lost a valued member and a colleague on November 26, 2020, with the death of Luisa Vigo-Cepeda;

Whereas Luisa Vigo-Cepeda served as a Professor in the Graduate School of Information Sciences and Technologies in University of Puerto Rico, Río Piedras Campus since 1990; Dr. Vigo also taught at Pontifical Catholic University Madre y Maestra, Dominican Republic; El Salvador-US-EGBCI Special Program; InterAmerican University of Puerto Rico, San Germán Campus; and at the University of Michigan;

Whereas Vigo-Cepeda received her Doctor of Philosophy in Library and Information Science from and Master of Arts in Higher Education from the University of Michigan; Master of Sciences in Library and Information Sciences from Case Western Reserve University; and Bachelor of Arts from Universidad de Puerto Rico, Recinto de Río Piedras;

Whereas Vigo-Cepeda co-founded the Association of Caribbean University, Research and Institutional Libraries (ACURIL); she served in numerous leadership roles and mentored many librarians and students in the organization; most recently Dr. Vigo-Cepeda served ACURIL Executive Secretary since 2008; Dr. Vigo-Cepeda organized and conducted numerous impactful workshops and conferences throughout her career; and

Whereas Vigo-Cepeda was an extraordinary member in the profession; she served as past president of the Sociedad de Bibliotecarios de Puerto Rico (Puerto Rico Library Society); and led the conference program planning for the IFLA World Library and Information Congress 2011 in Puerto Rico; she was an active member of the American Library Association; Association of Library and Information science Education (ALISE); and the Beta Beta Kappa, Puerto Rico Chapter of Beta Phi Mu; now, therefore, be it
