ON THE CATALOGING/CATALOGUING FRONT

The MAGERT Map Cataloging and Classification Committee met on June 25, 1995, at the ALA annual conference in Chicago. Betsy Mangan introduced Barbara Story, who is the new head of LC's Map Cataloging Division. That division is still understaffed. Typos in the LC Map Cataloging Manual have been corrected, appendices have been added to it, and it is being added to the Cataloger's Desktop CD-ROM. Betsy has already spent five hundred hours on the conversion of the G schedule. She hopes to finish it by the end of the summer. The geographic Cutters are being added to it. Yugoslavia still has to be broken up, and some African countries have to be done. The atlas numbers will be cleaned up. The changes for Russia have passed. The paper copy of the G schedule will not have Cutters. The maps that were part of the G schedule will go to the *Subject Cataloging Manual: Classification*. One of the appendices to that manual will cover how to formulate call numbers for cartographic material, and this information will also come out as an update to the *Map Cataloging Manual*. MARBI passed the proposal to have a URL to point to the maps, but they will not be part of the electronic G schedule to start with.

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The LC atlas catalogers have been trained in format integration, but the map catalogers have not been trained yet. So far they do not have documentation on format integration for maps. The National Digital Library has four new staff members. They are doing their own digital scanning. They started with the panoramic maps and will be doing the Eastern European topos next. They will do the Sanborn maps at some point, but there are copyright issues to be resolved first with both Sanborn and Chadwick-Healey.

Betsy raised the issue on MAPS-L of the classification of remote-sensing images. The problem is the subject Cutter. .A4, which is for pictomaps, is the only Cutter available. We need an additional Cutter for cases where there is just an image with no information added. Betsy asked if we need a number for digital as opposed to remote sensing images. Even if something calls itself an electronic atlas, LC catalogs it using the map schedule. They use the subject Cutter if the image has a theme. They are going to use the 072 field for the subject cataloging code, which could be used whether the map is thematic or not. Multiple subject heading terms can be grouped under one code. This code could be limited by truncating it. It is possible to have multiple 072 fields. .A47 is a possibility for a Cutter for remote sensing images. Digital images could have a Cutter after .A9 (special formats) such as .A95. LC will propose these Cutters. They hope to put them in the electronic map cataloging manual, and they would also appear in *Additions & Changes*, and possibly after the index maps in the G schedule. It has to be a two-digit number as all the single numbers are taken.

The proposal for an 007 field for remote-sensing images covers such elements as the altitude of the sensor (platform) and cloud cover. Some of the same things are covered in the metadata standards. Betsy will submit it to MAPS-L for comments soon. It will be submitted to MARBI and will be submitted to LC in November.

There is a proposal before MARBI on cataloging geospatial data. It involves changing the type e from printed map to cartographic material. A value would also be added for data that originated in digital form. There would be a 856 field for the digital image. Possibly a 530 field would be added for other versions available. Maps cannot be recataloged when they are digitized. AACR2 rule 0.24 states that one starts with the physical item, and that the carrier is more important than content. There is a meeting proposed in 1997 between ALA and the Joint Steering Committee to discuss major items such as whether this rule should be changed, and to discuss the concept of publication, and the concepts of editions and versions, iterations, and derivations. The main entry, multiple-level cataloging, entry under corporate body, and the effects of system requirements on description will also be discussed. However, people cannot wait that long, and LC is already looking at rule 0.24. LC is already cataloging Internet resources, which goes against rule 0.21, which discusses cataloging the item in hand. Internet material is not library material. University of California, Santa Barbara and LC are making a joint pro-

posal to catalog preferring the content over the carrier. LC is writing a rule interpretation on this.

In the final phase of format integration, the 006 field will be used for the elements that pertain to a secondary format. LC is proposing moving the atlases to the maps database from the pre-MARC books database. They will probably create a 006 for them. This will probably be done after format integration is completed.

Nothing has changed with AACCCM. Betsy has received proposed changes from Canadian map groups, from SLA, WAML, and MAGERT. She has not distributed the changes yet. A meeting is going to be held about it in the fall of 1996. They are discussing adding a section on digital maps. Betsy plans to distribute the changes by the end of the summer.

MARBI proposal 95.6 has to do with adding linking information for a photocopy or microform. The 533 would have a subfield 8 which would indicate which information goes to the original and which to the reproduction. This was rejected. It will be redrafted and presented at Midwinter. There is also a proposal to repeat the 245 and the 100 fields. The last issues are being discussed in order to bring USMARC, CANMARC, and UKMARC into closer alignment.

The Cooperative Cataloging Council Task Force decides what things are names and which are subjects. They did away with category 3, which covered cemeteries and two other things. They discussed whether the name or the subject catalogers will establish names of works of art. They will be considered names as soon as a definition of a work of art can be worked out. Structures are a problem. The uniform titles will probably be established in the language of the original work of art. Events will be on two lists. They will be names if they are named and planned and subjects if they are natural events. The final report will come out at the end of July. There is a discussion going on about 150s and 110s because Canada cannot have 110s as subjects. Bridges are now 150s but may be changed to 151s.

Sanctuary Map : Are You Safe Where You Live? / City Seekers. Scale not given. 1 map : col. ; 47 x 57 cm. plus accompanying descriptive text and index to sanctuaries.

Although not exactly "new" as this has a copyright date of 1993, it is unique and loaded with information. The map shows nuclear reactor sites; hazardous waste sites; correctional institutions with lists of those states having the lowest and highest prison escapes for the year 1991; top ten lists by state for the highest rates

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for murder and rape, most and least new breast cancer reports for 1993, and states with the most and least Superfund cleanup sites; locations of earthquakes with magnitudes of 5.0 or greater in the past 20 years; and finally, locations of "Power Vortices and Ancient Sanctuaries" intended to "encourage protection of native ceremonial and sacred holy lands."

The map's intent is twofold, to assist people in making informed decisions regarding where they might want to be relocating to, and to show the highest risk areas according to the above categories so that people living in some of these areas can possibly lessen or prevent future disasters. Includes 33 historical/geographic notes about specific cities and geographic locations and an inset showing lands held by various U.S. and Canadian federal agencies.

NEWS AND AWARDS FROM ASSOCIATIONS

Special Libraries Association, 86th Annual Conference, Montreal, Quebec, Geography and Map Division Awards, Monday, June 12, 1995, Queen Elizabeth Hotel

Bill M. Woods Award:

Mr. Paige G. Andrew, Chair of the Geography and Map Division of the Special Libraries Association announced that the Bill M. Woods Award for the best feature article to appear in the *Bulletin* during 1994 was awarded to HelenJane Armstrong for her article in the September Issue, "An Academic Map Library Loads GPO Cataloguing Tapes: A Case Study of Plans and Impacts." The article is a comprehensive clear and very readable presentation of the considerations involved in loading Marcive retrospective GPO cataloguing tapes into an online catalog. Dr. Armstrong was unable to attend the award ceremony.

Dr. Armstrong is Head of the Map and Imagery Library and an Assistant Chair of the Documents Department at the University of Florida. She holds a B.A. degree in Geography from Carroll College, a M.L.S. degree from the University of Oklahoma, and a Ph.D. in Geography from Oregon State University. Before founding the Map and Imagery Library at the University of Florida in 1973, she was responsible for founding and developing map libraries at the National Geographic Society and Northern Illinois University.

The Bill M. Woods Award, established in June 1975, is named for an early leader in the field of Map Librarianship and Education and includes a \$50.00 cash award. Bill M. Woods was responsible for the building of the important map collection at the University of Illinois in the 1950s; was a supporter of the Geography and Map Division, Special Libraries Association; and a recipient of the Division's 1959 Honors Award. This year marks the 7th time the award has been given.

Honors Award for Outstanding Achievement in Geography and Map Librarianship:

A framed certificate was presented by Mr. Paige G. Andrew, Chair of the Division, to Ms. Mary Lynette Larsgaard, Assistant Head, Map and Imaging Laboratory and Library at the University of California in Santa Barbara and the recipient of the Honors Award for Outstanding Achievement in Geography and Map Librarianship.

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The Honors Award is the highest award given by the Geography and Map Division of the Special Libraries Association. The Division began this recognition of achievement in Geography and Map Librarianship in 1955. This year marks the 27th time the award has been given. The award honors a person who has made outstanding contributions to the fields of geography, cartography, or map librarianship. Ms. Larsgaard is only the second person to receive both the Special Libraries Association and the American Library Association awards for outstanding contribution to map librarianship.

A prolific writer, Ms. Larsgaard has a bibliography of publications longer than many articles. Through her writings she shares her experience and wide-ranging expertise. Her landmark volume, *Map Librarianship*, is currently in its second edition. Two other volumes, *Topographic Mapping of the Americas, Australia, and New Zealand* and *Topographic Mapping of Africa, Antarctica, and Eurasia* expand our access to world mapping and facilitate reference and acquisitions. In addition to her books, she has served as Editor of the *Information Bulletin* of the Western Association of Map Libraries; Editor of *base line*; and edited issues of other journals. Her numerous writings include chapters in a variety of reference volumes; articles in major map and other library journals; regular columns to professional journals; and reviews of cartographic materials.

Ms. Larsgaard has served as Chair of the Special Libraries Association's Geography and Map Division, Chair of the American Library Association's Map and Geography Round Table, President of the Western Association of Map Libraries, and headed a number of other map library groups. Her active involvement in map and geography organizations also includes serving as chair of almost every committee and numerous presentations at conferences and workshops. Cataloging has been a major focus of her career and she founded the Cataloging Committee of the Geography and Map Division of the Special Libraries Association; was a representative to the Anglo-American Cataloging Committee for Cartographic Materials for both the Special Libraries Association and the American Library Association; is currently the representative for the Western Association of Map Libraries on the committee to review AACR2 and has written extensively about cataloging and classification. Ms. Larsgaard has led the profession in the development of cataloging for digital spatial data. She is probably one of the few people in the world that is currently doing 'live' cataloging of metadata for GIS.

Washington Map Society, Washington, D.C.

1995 Ristow Prize Winners:

Each year the Washington (DC) Map Society award the Ristow Prize for cartographic history and map librarianship in honor of Walter W. Ristow, one of America's premier map librarians and cartographic authors. He was for many years head of the Geography and Map Division at the Library of Congress and was founding president of the Society.

This year's winner is Stephanie Abbot Roper, doctoral candidate in American History at the University of Kansas. Her entry was entitled *Image is Everything: English Maps of Colonial North America as Promotional Tools, 1530-1660*. A cum laude graduate in American History from Smith College, Northampton, Massachusetts, she attained her MA in American History at the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks. She has considerable graduate teaching experience and is a member of honor societies in history and geography. Her present focus is on colonial cartographic history. Ms. Roper's entry will be published in the *Portolan*, the publication of the Washington Map Society. As winner of the Ristow Prize, she receives a cash award and membership in the WMS for the coming year.

This year's runner-up is Martin J. Coulter, an Englishman from Yorkshire attending the University of Aberdeen, Scotland. He graduated with honors this spring with a B.S.C. in Geography. His Undergraduate Honors Thesis "John Wood's Plan of the Cities of Aberdeen, 1828," was his entry in the competition. He would like to pursue further studies in geography and most likely in historical cartography. Mr. Coulter was the competition's first international winner, having learned of it on the Internet, another first. His research will be published in the *Portolan*; he also received a cash award and membership in the Washington Map Society.

Philip Lee Phillips Society Created by Library of Congress Geography and Map Division:

The Geography and Map Division of the Library of Congress recently established the Philip Lee Phillips Society to serve as an auxiliary fund-raising organization to develop, enhance, and promote the historical collections of the Geography and Map Division. The goals of the Society are to stimulate public interest; encourage financial donations to supplement appropriated funds for the acquisition of rare maps; facilitate gifts and bequests of significant geographic and cartographic materials; and advance the division's publication, education, and exhibition programs.

A steering committee has been formed to develop appropriate strategies to direct this effort. The inaugural meeting on April 10 was chaired by Kenneth Nebenzahl and Eric Wolf, longtime supporters of the Geography and Map Division. It was attended by a group of 15 invited participants who represented a variety of interests -- map collecting, map production, map sales, and the academic disciplines of geography, historical geography, cartography, and the history of cartography. Membership in the Society will be based on a primary donation of \$50 per year, with higher levels of giving also designated. Among membership benefits are a semiannual newsletter describing activities of regional map societies; an annual dinner and lecture held in the Library of Congress in association with a locally sponsored map fair or map auctions; special invitations to exhibit openings and to map symposia and workshops of interest to Society members; and guest lectures and workshops.

The Society is named in honor of the first chief of the Geography and Map Division, Philip Lee Phillips. Although maps, charts, and atlases have been part of the Library of Congress collections since its founding in 1800, Phillips was the first to recognize the value of the Library's cartographic materials and to organize and care for them. Even before being named the first Superintendent of Maps when the Hall of Maps and Charts was established in 1897, he devoted what time he could to the map and atlas collections that were stored in odd corners of the Capitol, sorting, arranging, cataloging, and serving requested items to congressional and other readers. He was also a pioneer in publicizing the Library's cartographic riches in publications to which he devoted much energy and which today still stand as landmarks in the field of cartobibliography.
