Re: Closure of Federal Archives and Records Center in Seattle, Washington

Dear Acting Director Vought,

On behalf of the American Library Association, I write to express our concern with the announced closure of the National Archives and Records Administration's Federal Archives and Records Center in Seattle, Washington, as proposed by the Public Buildings Reform Board on December 27, 2019¹ and announced by the National Archives on January 27, 2020.²

Americans deserve fair access to the documents of our history. The Seattle archives facility and staff provide public access to federal archival records, especially those of regional interest. Following the 2014 closure of the National Archives' facility in Anchorage, Alaska,³ this closure will relocate records even farther away from the communities that use them the most.

The Public Buildings Reform Board justifies the closure of the Seattle facility by noting its \$2.5 million deferred maintenance backlog. While past Congresses failed to invest in adequate maintenance, closing the facility without a replacement in the region would place the burdens of this mistake on the public who use these records.

We echo the concerns of historians,⁴ archivists,⁵ and state⁶ and Congressional leaders⁷ about this decision. We urge you to work with Congress and the National Archives to preserve Americans' access to our nation's historical records by investing in sufficient physical facilities, staff, and digitization.
