Forging the Missing Link

Forging the missing link in library instruction is a continuing concern. LIRT's program at the ALA annual meeting in San Francisco will focus on this concern (note also the theme of the LOEX meeting this year, listed elsewhere in this newsletter). The last issue of the newsletter asked for responses to this concern, and here are excerpts from some of them:

Several years ago we at Muskegan Community College invited all area high school librarians to our campus to discuss the need for cooperation on the part of all area libraries. The culmination of this meeting was. . . the publication of a list of serial holdings of the public libraries in the area, the community college, and many of the area high schools.

The meetings of the area libraries are the only opportunities for all area librarians to discuss problems and ideas for future projects. Library Instruction . . . is definitely in the future plans.

Library skills are being taught at all levels from 3rd grade through college. The fact that these skills have to be taught, retaught, and re-retaught should say something to us, not only about the need for cooperation, but also about our approach.

We need vertical cooperation, but we also need horizontal development. How many ... librarians are too busy worrying about the card catalog to the exclusion of educating and working with other faculty members? How many college education courses include a section on what should be expected from the school librarian, or how to work with that person?

"Does the Left Hand Know What the Right Hand Is Doing" was the title of a workshop held October 10, 1980, during the annual meeting of the South Carolina Library Association. The workshop posed the following questions to participants:



- Should school libraries be addressing library education, or should school libraries concentrate on making the library a "comfortable environment" and leave instructional efforts to higher education? (i.e., are students ready to learn library skills at primary and secondary levels?)
- 2. Should school and academic instruction programs be coordinated? If so, what standards can be set at each level of school?
- 3. What could be done to encourage more interaction between school and academic librarians?

TEACH 8,000 FRESHMEN HOW TO USE THE LIBRARY? It sounds impossible, but Ohio State University is doing just that. Since 1978, a one credit orientation course required for freshmen has included a 45 minute lecture by a librarian with transparencies and handouts. Students are required to complete a library walking exercise emphasizing search strategy on one of 26 topics. The objectives of the program are to teach basic library skills and to orient students to the OSU library system, with an emphasis on undergraduate libraries and the on-line catalog. Perhaps the most unusual aspect of the program is that about 25 librarians from outside the undergraduate libraries participate by giving lectures. These "volunteers" are rewarded at a yearly ceremony with a certificate for distinguished LIP (Library Instruction Program) service. Virginia Tiefel, Director of Undergraduate Libraries, Ohio State University, 1858 Neil Avenue Mall, Columbus, OH, initiated the program.

LIBRARY SCHOOL UPDATE: The Graduate School of Library and Information Science at Pratt Institute (Brooklyn) will be offering a full-semester course on library instruction this spring, reports Rhoda Garoogian, assistant dean and teacher of the course. Ms. Garoogian says a student request prompted her to act on her own commitment that a function as important as library instruction should not be omitted from master's level training. The faculty accepted the course with no reluctance.

The course will cover the history and philosophy of the library instruction movement; politics, finances, and management concerns; and general teaching techniques that apply. A mixture of students from various types of libraries and experiences is expected. Praises for Pratt - what's occurring at other library schools?



Reading Horizons 19:245-47 (Spring, 1979)

Suggested activities for teaching students reference study skills including activities on locating, evaluating, classifying, and utilizing information.

Elliot, Anna Bunker. "Show Them with Pictures," Momentum 10:17 (February, 1979) Suggests making a chart with simplified explanations of the Dewey Decimal codes, to help young children find their way around the library.

Meyers, Sister Marie Edna. "Teaching Library Skills to Deaf Children," <u>Catholic Library World</u> 51:58-60 (September, 1979)

Suggests that instructing deaf children to use the library can be effective if both teacher and librarian cooperate to make the instruction meaningful. Incorporating the children's own experiences into lessons, using informal teaching methods, and correlating the curriculum with library resources is recommended.
