Canadian Official Publications

Canadian Government Information Private LOCKSS Network (CGI - PLN)

http://plnwiki.lockss.org/wiki/index.php/CGI_network

Initiated in May 2012, the PLN currently includes 12 institutions. These are primarily Canadian universities but a U. S. university and a provincial organization are members and membership is open to those that meet the criteria. The CGI PLN mission is to preserve digital collections of government information using a geographically distributed network. It supports no-fee public access to government information of enduring value. While their current focus is on Canadian government publications, their working definition of “government information” includes resources produced by international organizations (IGOs) and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). Publications must be of interest and significance to Canadian residents.

Access to Canadian Government Information .

The Treasury Board of Canada has begun internal discussions about a web renewal plan which may result in a major reduction of federal government websites <http://www.tbs-sct.gc.ca/ws-nw/wu-fe/rot-rid/index-eng.asp>. The goal as indicated by the title of the document is to reduce redundant, outdated, and trivial content. At the time of this writing, Library and Archives Canada has not committed to capturing, archiving, or making the content available after it is removed.

There is concern about access to information at both the federal and provincial levels of government. The annual report of the Canadian Journalist for Free Expression (CJFE), *Review of Free Expression in Canada*, notes a growing “cult of secrecy” in the Canadian government. http://cjfe.org/sites/default/files/2013_CJFE_Review-of-free-expression-in-Canada.pdf

In its “Report Card 2012 – 13” The Department of Fish and Game received an “F” for its “... zeal in muzzling scientists, controlling its message and keeping critical information from the public.” The only “As” were awarded to The Parliamentary Budget Office for its open dialogue about open government and access to information and the government of Québec for prohibiting the use of strategic lawsuits against public participation (SLAPP).

At the provincial level in British Columbia there is concern for what seems to be a growing “oral culture” at the top levels of government based upon recent Freedom of Information requests that elicit the response of “no responsive records.” This is detailed in the Denham investigative report F13-01

by the British Columbia Office of the Information & Privacy Commissioner. According to this report, in the Office of the Premier much communication happens verbally or is classified as transient meaning that it is not written down or very quickly deleted. Thus there is often no tangible record.

Depository Service Program (DSP).

The DSP announced that by March of 2014 it would no longer be producing, printing, or warehousing hard copies of publications although it will continue to acquire and catalog print publications. It will also continue to acquire, catalog, and provide access to electronic publications. Under proposed government policy, government organizations would be restricted from producing print publications except under special circumstances and publications would be available to the public on a “print on demand” basis.

The next meeting of the DSP Library Advisory Committee is scheduled for August 2013 if there are a sufficient number of agenda items.

Statistics Canada.

This agency created the StatCan Blog to offer Canadians the chance to comment and provide feedback on the agency’s direction as well as to feature the latest agency reports.

U N Economic Commission for Africa – ECA

The Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) was established by the United Nations (UN) Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) in 1958 as one of the UN's five regional commissions. ECA's mandate is to promote the economic and social development of its member States, foster intra-regional integration, and promote international cooperation for Africa's development. ECA provides technical advisory services to African governments, intergovernmental organizations and institutions, and is the only UN agency mandated to operate at the regional and subregional levels to harness resources and bring them to bear on Africa's priorities.

ECA has seven thematic areas of focus: Macroeconomic Policy, Regional Integration and Trade, Social Development, Natural Resources, Innovation and Technology, Gender, and Governance. It has six policy centers: the African Centre for Statistics; the African Minerals Development Centre; the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning (IDEP); the African Trade Policy Centre; the African Climate Policy Centre; and the Land Policy Initiative. There are also five Sub-Regional Offices (SROs), each taking the lead in their respective sub-regions. The ECA’s website has recently been redesigned with a new more cohesive, modern look and feel.

Publications and Information. Many UNECA publications are available for free download under the “Publications” menu (<http://www.uneca.org/publications>). Publications are divided into essential readings, flagship reports, policy reports, and policy briefs. They are also browseable in a single long list. While the earlier version of the page linked to publications dating all the way back 1998, the current oldest publication dates from 2000. However, the date limits start at 1982, so perhaps earlier publications may be added in the future. Also, each of the thematic areas of focus and SROs also has a “publications” link for its own publications.

Institutional Repository. The ECA Library also hosts an institutional repository (<http://repository.uneca.org/>) of published resources including flagship publications, journal articles, conference proceedings, technical reports, mission reports, annual reports, working papers, speeches and other grey literature dating back as far as 1958. Many, though not all, of the resources included in the repository are available for download.

Statistics. The ECA StatBase (<http://ecastats.uneca.org/statbase/>) is a web-based platform for the compilation and dissemination of statistical data on various socio-economic indicators on African countries. It includes a wide range of indicators covering areas such as agriculture, economics, energy, environment and climate change, exchange rates, government finance, inflation, Millennium Development Goals, monetary statistics, social and demographic statistics, the Sustainable Development Report for Africa V, and trade and balance of payment.

The United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE), one of five regional commissions of the United Nations, was set up in 1947 by the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). Its major aim is to promote pan-European economic integration, bringing together 56 member countries located in the European Union, non-EU Western and Eastern Europe, South-East Europe and Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) and North America. Any interested UN member States may participate in its work, and over 70 international professional organizations and other non-governmental organizations take part in UNECE activities.

The UNECE provides analysis, policy advice and assistance to governments, and it focuses on the United Nations global mandates in the field of economics, in cooperation with other global players and key stakeholders, notably the business community. The UNECE's expertise covers sectors such as: economic cooperation and integration, energy, environment, housing and land management, population, statistics, timber, trade, and transport.

The website includes a great deal of useful information, including sections on the main UNECE areas of work, statistics, latest news and events, and publications.

Publications and Information. Publications are linked in various places throughout the UNECE site, but the main publications page (<http://www.unece.org/publications/oes/welcome.html>) is linked off of the “Information Resources” tab at the top. This page displays a list of recent publications as well as area of activity. Most current publications are available online in full text form, primarily as pdfs. For many older publications, only the UN symbol, sales publication number, ISBN, and price are listed. The “How to Order?” link leads to contact information for sales and non-sales publications.

Statistics. Especially useful is the Statistics Programme's site (http://www.unece.org/stats/stats_h.html), which includes a dropdown menu for quick access to Key Indicators from the UNECE Statistical Database. Statistics resources are grouped by topic (i.e., economic statistics, environment and sustainable development, gender statistics, etc.) under the “Areas of Work” section and also available as “statistics on-line” in the UNECE Statistical Database (<http://w3.unece.org/pxweb/>).

It presents the organization's operational activities according to different statistical categories and domains.

About the FAO. The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations – FAO, leads international efforts to defeat hunger. FAO serves both developed and developing countries as a neutral forum where all nations can meet to negotiate agreements and debate policy. FAO is also a source of knowledge and information. FAO's web pages are an excellent free resource for anyone to use who is looking for any kind of international agricultural statistics or other information. Human Development Reports

Celebrating twenty-five years of publication in 2013, the Human Development Report series published by the United Nations Development Programme with significant input from many other agencies and sections of the world body continues to provide solid and well grounded data and narrative accounts for conditions in the world at the broadest level. Combining social indicators, beginning with Infant Mortality and Life Expectancy at Age One, and then adding in national macro economic indicators such as GDP and Trade, the Human Development Reports set out to offer useful measures of the combined economic and social situation of the world's people within nations, regions, and globally. For the first time this year, the Human Development Report is published in Swahili, the most widely spoken African language. This year the global Human Development Report is issued in twenty-one languages, in both print and online editions, which begins:

The 21st century is witnessing a profound shift in global dynamics, driven by the fast-rising new powers of the developing world. China has overtaken Japan as the world's second biggest economy, lifting hundreds of millions of people out of poverty in the process. India is reshaping its future with new entrepreneurial creativity and social policy innovation. Brazil is raising its living standards by expanding international relationships and antipoverty programmes that are emulated worldwide.

But the "Rise of the South" is a much larger phenomenon. Indonesia, Mexico, South Africa, Thailand, Turkey and other developing countries are becoming leading actors on the world stage. The 2013 Human Development Report identifies more than 40 developing countries that have done better than expected...

National and Regional Human Development Reports

More than 600 national reports have been written, on a frequent basis, since 1990, coming from 140 countries. In addition there are reports that cover entire regions, and some that cover only part of a country. A new feature of the web page is the ability to search for regional and national reports through thematic maps, and other graphic features are being developed.

This Armenia HRD 2012 on the theme of Sustainable Development is currently being prepared.
- **Moldova – 2012.** *European Aspirations and Human Development of the Republic of Moldova.*
This Moldova HRD 2012 approaches the European integration aspirations of Moldova from the perspective of human development, and presents each process for the country with the added perspective of the other.
- **Tajikistan – 2012.** *Poverty in the Context of Climate Change.*
This Tajikistan HRD 2012 reports on the objectives, principles, contents and ways of putting into practice Tajikistan's climate policy within the country and internationally. As such, it can serve as a model of what can be done by other countries for this universal problem.

Reports are usually available for free download on the UNDP site, and can often also be purchased for a nominal cost from Oxford University Press or other publisher. In addition, The database of indicators from the entire HDR series is also available without charge on the HDR web site

International Labour Organization – ILO

The ILO was founded in 1919, in the wake of a destructive war, to pursue a vision based on the premise that universal, lasting peace can be established only if it is based on social justice. The ILO became the first specialized agency of the UN in 1946....The main aims of the ILO are to promote rights at work, encourage decent employment opportunities, enhance social protection and strengthen dialogue on work-related

issues...The unique tripartite structure of the ILO gives an equal voice to workers, employers and governments to ensure that the views of the social partners are closely reflected in labour standards and in shaping policies and programmes. *From the ILO web site, viewed June 2013.*

Renouf Provides All ILO Titles. The International Documents Community continues to be well served in that Renouf Company which provides a full range of ILO publications, including back files, and is a primary source for ILO in the U.S. and more broadly.

Green Jobs. The theme of the current 102nd International Labour Conference focuses on “Green Jobs” as summarized on the ILO web site: “No sustainable development without environmental sustainability and decent work. The contribution of the world of work to the greening of the economy is critical – and presents a real opportunity – to realize the ILO’s social goals.”

Current Titles of Special Note

- *Labour Markets of Emerging Economies: Has growth Translated into More and Better Jobs?* Edited by Sandrine Cazes and Sher Verick. Geneva: International Labour Office. Co-published with Palgrave Macmillan. 2013. 652 pp. ISBN 978-92-2-124565-0 US \$105. Issued May 15, 2013. Labor market difficulties remain in developing economies, but are mitigated when there are effective policies in place to deal with matters of under-employment and associated poverty. Part I provides comparative perspectives for China and India as well as other countries. Part II gives in-depth case studies for Brazil, Indonesia, South Africa and Turkey. Especially since there is much new quantitative data as well as many lessons for policy-makers this is a useful addition for policymakers and research staff as well.
- *Perspectives on Labour Economics for Development.* Edited by Sandrine Cazes and Sher Verick. Geneva: International Labour Office. 2013. 270 pp. ISBN : 978-92-2-126714-0 US \$48. Issued March 1 2013. Also available for free download on ILO site. Co-published in South Asia by Academic Foundation (ISBN 978-81-7188-985-3). Useful for policy makers and teachers in countries with middle and low income economies, this title provides a sound survey of labor economies but without overly technical language or concepts. Part I provides a broad overview, Part II deals with specifics of wages, migration and education, while Part III deals with labour market institutions and policies. A widely useful general reference volume for labor economies in developing countries.
- *Public Sector Shock: The Impact of Policy Retrenchment in Europe.* Edited by Daniel Vaughan-Whitehead. Geneva: International Labour Office. 2013. 652 pp. ISBN 978-92-2-126568-9.US \$85. Also free down load on ILO site. Issued April 24, 2013. Balancing the budgets on many European countries is achieved at the present time by deep cuts in public sector jobs and wages. Termed “public sector shock,” this trend has profound implications for service in many countries. Education and training are also affected in like manner by cuts there. The process and effect of this process in many countries is studied here, beginning with Greece, Ireland, Bulgaria and Romania, and continuing to a number of other economies.
- *Resilience in a Downturn: The Power of Financial Cooperatives.* Geneva: International Labour Office, 2013. 58 pp. ISBN 978-92-2-127030-0 US \$32. Free down load on ILO site. Issued

May 15, 2013. Sited in a thorough historical and operational analysis of financial cooperatives such as credit unions, this new report creates a strong case for the value of such as a viable alternative to the for-profit banking system, especially during the current global financial difficulties. Financial Cooperatives are seen as powerful tools to aid in work against poverty and for decent work.

- *Work Sharing during the Great Recession: New Developments and Beyond*. Edited by Naj Ghosheh and Jon C. Messenger. Geneva: International Labour Office. 2013. 250 pp. ISBN 978-92-2-124563-6 US \$48. Also free download on ILO site. Issued June 18, 2013. Work-sharing as a tool for saving jobs is examined in this volume for several countries in Europe and other regions.

International Maritime Organization - IMO

IMO – the International Maritime Organization – is the United Nations specialized agency with responsibility for the safety and security of shipping and the prevention of marine pollution by ships.

IMO currently has over 200 titles available in English. All of these are listed in the current Publications Catalogue, available on the website. Recent publications include:

- *MARPOL* [marine pollution] *Annex VI & NTC* [Nitrogen Oxide Technical Code] 2008, 2013 Edition. Regulations for the prevention of air pollution from ships, including requirements for control of emissions from ships, and regulations on energy efficiency for ships. Price: 30 GBP
- *IAMSAR* [International Aeronautical and Maritime Search and Rescue] *Manual: Volume III*. Designed to be carried aboard rescue units, aircraft and vessels to help with search and rescue. Price: 50 GBP.
- *International Maritime Dangerous Goods Code* 2012 Edition. This is an international guideline to the safe transportation or shipment of dangerous goods or hazardous materials by water on vessel. 2 vols. Price: 110 GBP.
- *Ships' Routing* (2013 Edition) Describes routing measures to ensure safety of shipping and the cleanliness of the oceans. Price: 120 GBP.

Librarians may also find the information on the knowledge Center page of the IMO's website to be useful. After creating a public account, anyone can access the full text of official records of IMO conferences. Other resources available include tips on locating amendments to IMO conventions; acquisition lists of new publications related to law and policy, law of the sea, maritime security, pollution, etc.; and a bibliography of legal articles related to the work of the IMO.

IMF eLibrary (www.elibrary.imf.org). The number of assets in the eLibrary has increased to more than 13,000 titles. This past spring a new look and new features for the eLibrary were rolled out:

- Access to IMF publications has been improved with an enhanced user interface and more intuitive search and navigation features.
- Search functions have been improved with the addition of a tool bar that allows users to search by “Countries,” “Publication Series,” and “Authors.” Users can still search by entering keywords in the search box; and general searches can be further refined, or narrowed, by using a module that appears on the left side of the page.
- The “Recommended Reading” list is now a carousel on the homepage.
- The homepage now includes a spot for video—an introduction to the enhancements to the eLibrary is currently being featured.
- Users can now subscribe to “Email Alerts”
- A new version of the IMF Data site was rolled out in May. Users can now:
 - view and change data queries easily;
 - find data faster using the improved search functions;
 - visualize and animate data across countries using the IMF Data Mapper tool;
 - view and download a schedule listing expected updates
- Access to the eLibrary across different tablet devices is now possible.
- Monthly webinars covering both the text and data sites of the eLibrary are being offered now. These webinars complement the user guides and startup guides already available on the site.
- Forthcoming features to be implemented later in the summer include:
 - Single Sign On, which will bring together the different components of the eLibrary (text, data, AREAR, and eBookstore) depending on the subscription package; and
 - Display of “related titles” based on your search or previously viewed items

The OECD consists of 34 member countries. The last expansion was in 2010 when Chile, Slovenia, Israel, and Estonia formalized membership. Russia is still in open discussion for membership. OECD offers “enhanced engagement” to Brazil, China, India, Indonesia and South Africa. While this is not the same as membership, it is useful to researchers in that many of the same statistics collected for member countries are collected for these nations.

Since the last report, many new publications and statistical reports have been updated in the *OECD iLibrary*. With the “Great Recession” in full swing, the OECD’s role in reporting the state of economic conditions in its member countries and their impact on social conditions is critical. The OECD produces many ongoing reports and new editions were released for these titles and many others. The OECD releases many monographs each year.

It is important to remember that in addition to areas with which we traditionally associate the OECD such as development, economic cooperation, education, foreign aid, labor, and migration, the OECD often publishes material that we may not associate with the organization. Likewise, the OECD publishes on many other parts of the world. The OECD website states “Over time, OECD’s focus has broadened to include extensive contacts with non-member economies and it now maintains co-operative relations with more than 70 of them” *Viewed June 13, 2013*.

We also tend to think of OECDiLibrary as adding current content but not retrospectively adding content formerly available only in paper. This is changing. Historical additions have been made to the OECDiLibrary. The historical *ECMT Round Tables* were scanned and are now available. These were a series of conference proceedings from 1969 to 1997 on transportation issues in Europe. A major addition was the inclusion of the *OECD Economic Outlook* back to its first issue in 1967. Hopefully, we will continue to see many more items such as these added.

The OECD still produces print publications but all are available in electronic format. The OECD site continues to offer some free content, but to access more detail and historical files, it is necessary to subscribe to *OECDiLibrary*. *OECDiLibrary* continues to provide remarkable value in both statistical and narrative content. OECD is exhibiting at ALA in Booth 0538.

The contents are arranged by language, with two chapters each for English (representing the UK and U.S.) and for Portuguese (covering Brazil and Portugal). The scope and number of resources varies from country to country, but this is the first place to look to identify the state of information literacy theory and practice in different areas of the world.

Events and organizations of importance are highlighted at the bottom of the top page. Five topics are highlighted in the UNEP News, each opening to a new page. Ask Today’s Expert, gives the opportunity for the posing of questions to an expert in the field. Questions and answers can be viewed as can upcoming and previous sessions. Short film videos are also available (*Forests: The Heart of a Green Economy*) as are links to upcoming UNEP events. There is a useful A-Z index at the bottom of the home page.

The *Publications* section of the site includes Recently Published, Interactive e-Books, and Forthcoming, also Best Sellers and Periodicals sections. Flagship publications include *Global Environment Outlook*. Recently Published, Best Seller titles are available full-text in .pdf. There is a Google search engine for UNEP books. The search engine searches UNEP titles in addition to other related sites. Other access points include:

- EarthPrint.com, “The World’s Leading Environmental and Agricultural Bookstore” is UNEP’s official online bookstore for its publications: titles can be searched and purchased online. Information related to the areas of interest of UNIDO — industrial development, globalization, and environmental sustainability — can now be found under the Resources tab of the UNIDO website in sections on Publications and Statistics.

I. Publications

Flagship publications. Editions since January 1, 2013 include:

- *The Annual Report 2012.* This year, responding to requests from Member States, the report deals with the impact of UNIDO's projects and programs on the lives of men, women and youth in developing and transition economy countries. The report can be downloaded as a pdf or e-pub.

(It's conclusion: "World industrial production growth slightly increased in the first quarter of 2013 Despite this break from a nearly three-year downward trend, the prospect of recovery remains fragile for the majority of industrialized and emerging industrial economies.")

Numerous older publications – dealing with industrial development, globalization, and the environment are also listed. Most are available on the site as pdfs; but print and CD copies of some can be ordered online.

II. Statistics.

New database releases are:

- INDSTAT4- 2013 edition contains highly disaggregated data on the manufacturing sector for the period 1990 onwards at the 4-digit level of ISIC.
- INDSTAT2- 2013 edition contains time series data on the manufacturing sector for the period 1963 onwards.
- IDSB - Industrial Demand-Supply Balance Database, 2013 contains time series data on the manufacturing sector for the period 1963 onwards at the two-digit level of ISIC. Various purchase and subscription options are listed.

The UN Statistics Division administratively sits under the Department of Economic and Social Affairs and Economic and Social Development. There are four topical branches that collect, compile and disseminate key statistical publications, as well as work on methodological standards for classifying statistics in their areas. They are: Economic Statistics Branch, Demographic and Social Statistics, Environment and Energy Statistics Branch, and the Trade Statistics Branch. The final branch is the Statistical Services Branch that is responsible for compiling and documenting “crosscutting UN databases for print and electronic dissemination”.

UN Statistics Division Major Work and Accomplishments, 2013

A new brochure published by UNSD, it is chock full of amazing information about all of the statistical programs managed by UNSD. This fifty-page report can function as a ready reference guide to UNSD resources and statistical program. Each entry includes a brief history of the program or statistical publication, an explanation of the methodology, how the information is published and disseminated, and the technical cooperation, e.g. how the UN is working with member states to ensure data collection is done. Available online this one may be worth printing out and keeping next to your desk!

Gender Statistics. This excerpt from the **Gender Statistics** section gives an idea of the content and scope of the Gender Stats programme:

The Statistics Division’s work on gender statistics was initiated in the early 1980s. The programme has been geared to users’ needs, and has provided technical support to women’s and gender units of the United Nations funds and programmes, statistical units of regional organizations, and national statistical offices.

- **History.** The Statistics Division’s work on gender statistics was initiated in the early 1980s, mid-way into the United Nations Decade for Women: Equality, Development and Peace (1976-1985) and in response to the call for more statistics on the status of women. The gender statistics programme was designed to address three main problem areas:

- The need for national statistical systems to take gender issues into account in all stages of data production;
- The limited availability and accessibility of gender statistics;
- The under-utilization of gender statistics.
- **Methodological Work.** The methodological work in gender statistics has involved reviewing concepts and methods currently used in the collection of official statistics, and identifying ways of integrating a gender perspective in order to avoid biases in the data collection, presentation and dissemination. Since 2007 the Division has been working on the development of guidelines for the measurement of violence against women. The Division plans to publish in 2013 the Guidelines for Producing Statistics on Violence against Women, in line with the list of recommended indicators. In 2011, UNSD engaged in the preparation of a new gender statistics manual.
- **Compilation and Dissemination of Gender Statistics.** Drawing from official data collected from countries by the Statistics Division and other United Nations agencies, a wide range of outputs addressing different audiences and areas of policy concern have been produced. The data is accessible at <http://unstats.un.org/unsd/demographic/products/indwm/>
- **Technical Cooperation and Capacity Building.** The Statistics Division provides a variety of technical assistance in gender statistics to national statistical offices, regional programmes and United Nations agencies. Another significant area of technical cooperation has been in the implementation of projects at the national and regional levels. For example, in the Caribbean region, a regional project funded under the UN Development Account in the early 2000s helped establish a programme on social and gender statistics in the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) preneurship.
- **Partnerships and Coordination.** Much of the Division's accomplishments in this programme can be attributed to its successful cooperation with and the financial support of various agencies and development partners, including the World Bank, UNFPA and UN-Women.

UN COMTRADE Database.

This section might also be titled: “How I learned to stop worrying and love trade statistics.” The United Nations Commodity Trade Statistics Database (UN Comtrade) was established in the early 1960s. For almost fifty years, it has provided a wealth of trade information to policy makers, the business community, research institutions and the general public. It stores standardized official annual trade statistics reported by countries and reflects international merchandise flows detailed by commodity and partner country with coverage reaching up to 99 percent of world merchandise trade.

Trade questions can be daunting. Trying to figure out which source to use – World Bank, IMF, United Nations, a country's trade agency, etc. is also tricky. When faced with an import/export question covering several countries and time periods, the starting place should be UN COMTRADE. UNSD has been making regular improvements to the interface and documentation. In 2012, the query form did not work well with Firefox, Chrome or Safari; but that has since changed, although sometimes the forms can still be a bit buggy in these browsers. PCs tend to play better with the database than Macs. There is a very comprehensive knowledge base that you can find answers to technical, methodological, and content questions. It's really a goldmine for understanding and using trade statistics. <http://unstats.un.org/unsd/tradekb/Knowledgebase/>

UN Comtrade gives instant access to more than 1.75 billion records on merchandise trade from over 200 reporting countries or areas covering 48 years of data and more than 6000 different products. There is both a free version and a Premium Access version of UN COMTRADE.

Using Express Selection enables you to fully customize your trade data search. Best of all, the form has auto-fill and search for codes and variable names built in, so if you don't know that the code for "the World" is 0 and China's is 150, the search form can help. Note, you will need to know which trade classification system and version to use. Thankfully these are standard classification systems, HS and SITC for which UN COMTRADE has plenty of documentation. This page from the knowledge base is a very good starting point:

Under the Metadata and Reference section, there are lists and explanations of all codes as well. For the Commodity Classifications List see: <http://comtrade.un.org/db/mr/rfCommoditiesList.aspx>
The Country list is extremely helpful in finding out how many years of data are available for a country, and which classifications are available: <http://comtrade.un.org/db/mr/rfReportersList.aspx>
For example, the entry for China from the Country List provides links that connect to all the supporting documentation you may need. Note the country code is also given here.

For the question above, here's how you would go about creating your query in the Express Selection form, limiting to the SITC 1 and 2 digit levels. Using the free version, which limits you to the 50,000 records, you have to scope your query in such a way that you can get the data in "chunks". So for this question, a query was run for each year rather than trying to query for all ten years at once. Other ways to work with the download limit are focusing on specific commodities. Designate only one to two trade partners at a time.

- Selected classification: SITC Rev.2
- Selected commodities: AG0,AG1,AG2
- Selected reporters: 156
- Selected years: 2003
- Selected partners: 0
- Selected trade flows: Export

Once you submit the query, the table will appear on the page and you get the option to sort the data in various ways, download as .csv (which typically will open automatically in Excel). There are options to view the data in a graph, get explanatory notes, view data that is not available.

- The next **World Health Report** will discuss the contributions of research to universal health coverage. “Everyone should have access to the health services they need without being forced into poverty when paying for them. This report argues that universal health coverage – with full access to high-quality services for prevention, treatment and financial risk protection – cannot be achieved without the evidence provided by scientific research. It maintains that all nations should be producers of research as well as consumers. The process of discovery should take place not only in academic centres but also in public health programmes where people seek health care and use the services provided. Investigations ranging from clinical trials to health policy studies can help chart the course to improved health outcomes and

reduced poverty, but research needs national and international backing to succeed.” (This report will be available in September 2013 in print and online).

- **Global Status Report on Road Safety 2013.** The *Global status report on road safety 2013* presents information on road safety from 182 countries, accounting for almost 99% of the world’s population. The report indicates that worldwide the total number of road traffic deaths remains unacceptably high at 1.24 million per year. Only 28 countries, covering 7% of the world’s population, have comprehensive road safety laws on five key risk factors: drinking and driving, speeding, and failing to use motorcycle helmets, seat-belts, and child restraints.

Drinking-water coverage in 2011 remains at 89% – which is 1% above the MDG drinking-water target. In 2011, 768 million people relied on unimproved drinking-water sources.
