At the steering committee meeting in Washington D.C. there should be some discussion about the possibility of creating students memberships, corporate memberships and increasing the current membership to \$15.00.

We closed the fiscal year in the black thanks to the Gala event in Chicago. Donations are slow in coming in as of this writing we have gotten \$1100.00 in donations that can be applied to the challenge grant, which ended on December 1, 2000.

The endowment fund pledges total \$12,750.00. I am currently working with another member of the roundtable on second challenge grant for donations from nonroundtable members. We also received \$500.00 in donations from publishers.

It is my goal to have by the midwinter conference the draft procedures for each committee in the roundtable for the handling of fiscal matters. It is the responsibility of the committee chair and the membership of the committee to review and make corrections to each procedure.

At the annual conference in San Francisco 2001, my current term will end. I am throwing my hat back into the ring to run for a second term. I do hope I can count on everyone voting for me at least once. It is too bad we are unable to follow the unwritten laws set down during the golden age of American politics -- "to vote early and often" -- things would be so much more fun.

Book Reviews

<u>Psappha A Novel of Sappho</u> by Peggy Ullman Bell Upstart Press, 2000 (ISBN 0-9701274-9-9)

Because little is known about this fascinating figure of ancient Greece, many writers have been compelled to take up pen to fill in the blanks of Sappho's life. Most scholars agree that she was the greatest woman poet of that time, known as "The Poetess" just as Homer was known as "The Poet." However, the early Christians destroyed her work because of its lesbian content resulting in years of disagreements about her sexual orientation.

Bell makes her debut as a novelist by exploring anew Sappho's life and loves. The title (the name Sappho used for herself) reflects the story's emphasis on her personal life.

After an excerpt from Will Durant's <u>Life of Greece</u> in which Sappho's notoriety, accomplishments, the destruction of her work, and the unknown circumstances of her death are discussed, the story begins when Sappho is banished from Lesbos. Kerkolos, her future husband, rescues her from a storm-ravaged ship and in his gynake-on (harem), Sappho is introduced to the delights of Iphis by Gongyla, an African woman of royal blood. Sappho experiences motherhood before Kerkolos dies leaving her to fight her mother-in-law over the house where she starts a school. Sappho's tumultuous life includes bedding both men and women but at Gongyla's death she throws herself off a cliff to remain with her most beloved.

It is obvious that Bell has done much research and her sensuous sex scenes are titillating but the book needs a good editor. Typos, grammar and plot errors overwhelm the writing. Superior novels of Sappho have already been written.
