### Fees for Service

SUNDAY, JUNE 19  
4:30-6 PM

The practice of FREE library service is being challenged again. This time, computer-based services priced beyond the hard-times budgets of free libraries today are being offered as lure. And "intellectual freedom" free-traders bite hard: "How," they ask, "can we deprive those users who will pay extra for these services?" The IF free-traders are shocked, as if librarians would be denying people's primal urge to pay; and they are myopic, as if ignorant of the free-trade fact that these services cannot make profit without substantial subsidization from the general public monies or libraries would never have been approached as a market.

Who pays? Who profits? When new fee services are added, are any free practices curtailed in libraries? Nowadays, when most folks have trouble paying overdue fines, can we pretend that fee charges for services will not deny service to many? Can libraries that charge fees for service confidently continue to rely on good will and tax support from the public? Do service fees constitute double taxation on an already overburdened taxpayer? Will push for federal funding guarantee free services?

SRRT supports library workers involvement at ALA to struggle to oppose any monetary restrictions on public access to library collections and services. To inform ourselves on this renewed threat to public access, SRRT offers a rousing program featuring folk who offer a wide range of expertise:

FAY M. BLAKE, Reader Services Librarian, California State Polytechnic University. Co-author of "The Selling of the Public Library" (Drexel LQ, January, '77).

GLORIA HAUSE, Director of the College of Lifelong Learning, Wayne State University. Editor of the revived Broadside Press, Detroit.

RICK HILL, Professor of urban studies, MSU, activist in the Union for Radical Political Economy, editor of Kapitalistate. Researcher into Detroit's educational services.

BERNADINE HODUSKI, staff member for the US Congress' Joint Committee on Printing, longtime SRRT and GODORT activist who advocates Documents to the people.

ANN LIPOW, Director of bibliographic data-base searching at UC Berkeley. Activist in the RASD/MARS Discussion Group in ALA.

Barbara Ford, SRRT Coordinator, will preside at this free-wheeling presentation where each panelist will give a six-to-ten minute statement, allowing for lots of time for discussion and questions and action from audience participants. JOIN IN!

BECAUSE...J. P. Stevens is the nation's most arrogant corporate law-breaker. It has been found guilty of tax evasion, discriminatory employment practices, the firing and threatening of pro-union employees and the coercion of employees through interrogation. Working conditions in Stevens plants are almost unbelievable in this day and age. Its long history of lawlessness, its callousness to the rights and needs of its employees, and the inability of the National Labor Relations Board to compel enforcement make it necessary to convince J. P. Stevens management that American consumers will not condone corporate law breaking designed to deprive thousands of Americans of social justice and economic opportunity.

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### Sourcebook

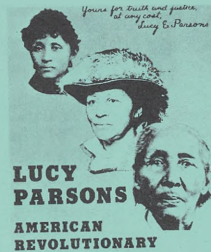
