**GLBTF PROGRAM
1998 Annual Conference - Washington DC**

Plans are complete for the 1998 GLBTF Annual Program in Washington D.C. The program is entitled: "What have you done for me lately?" Lesbian and gay youth speak out. Young people will discuss how librarians, educators, and other allies can begin to address their issues and provide the resources they need.

Two brief videos will introduce the program: "My Mom's Two Names Are Judy," (10 minutes) produced by the Lesbian and Gay Parents Association; and the two minute testimony of alumnus Ken Goodman to the Montgomery (Maryland) County Board of Education in March, 1996. A short bibliography for educators will be provided by the moderator, listing appropriate literature for various age groups in the K-12 range.

Moderator for the program will be Jill Karpf, Middle School Media Specialist, Montgomery County Maryland Public Schools, and Founding Member and former Co-Chair of Gay-Lesbian-Straight Education Network, DC chapter (GLYSEN-DC). The three young (under 21) panelists will be Willy Diaz and Harry Santana from Green Chimney Social Children's Services, Inc (A New York City social welfare organization) and a young person from Sexual Minority Youth Assistance League (SMYAL), Washington, DC.

Final arrangements are being made through ALA to audiotape the program for sale at the conference. (However, one speaker has not signed the required release form; so it is possible that the ALA will not tape the program.)

This program will be co-sponsored by YALSA, ALSC, PLA, AASL. The program will be held on MONDAY, June 29, 1998 from 10:30am to 12 noon - immediately after the Book Awards Breakfast.

Book Award Committee

Winners of ALA's Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Book Awards An- nounced

AWARD WINNERS: Lucy Jane Bledsoe, author of *Working Parts*, and Adam Mastoon, author of *The Shared Heart: Portraits and Stories Celebrating Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Young People* are the winners of the American Library Association's (ALA) Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Book Awards for literature and nonfiction.

Bledsoe won the fiction award for her first novel, published by Seal Press, about a lesbian cyclist and skilled bicycle mechanic Lori Taylor as she undertakes the challenge of learning to read. The nonfiction winner, published by William Morrow, pairs Mastoon's photos with the words of teens and young adults describing their awakenings to gay, lesbian or bisexual identities and the effects of their awakenings on the world around them.

Five finalists were named in each category. Literature finalists included Elana Dykewomon for *Beyond the Pale*, Press Gang Publishers; Judith Katz for *The Escape Artist*, Firebrand; Scott Heim for *In Awe*, HarperCollins; and Persimmon Blackbridge for *Prozac Highway*, Press Gang Publishers.

Nonfiction finalists were Amy Hoffman for *Hospital Time*, Duke University Press; James Sears for *Lonely Hunters: An Oral History of Lesbian and Gay Southern Life, 1948-1968*, Westview Press; Susan Raffo, editor of *Queerly Classed*, South End Press; and Arlene Stein for *Sex and Sensibility: Stories of a Lesbian Generation*,* University of California Press.

The awards, sponsored by the Social Responsibilities Round Table (SRRT) Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Task Force, will be presented June 29, 1998, during the GLBTF Book Awards Breakfast.

Guest speakers at the breakfast include: U.S. Representative Barney Frank, David Bergman, author of *Gaiety Transfigured* and editor of numerous works, Adam Mastoon, winner of the 1998 Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Book Award for Non-fiction, Lucy Jane Bledsoe, winner of the 1998 Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Book Award for Literature.

You will not want to miss this event which features the winning authors, some wonderful guest speakers, and giveaways. It is also a great way to show support for the Book Awards.

Call for Book Nominations

Nominations for the 1999 Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Book Award are being accepted by the committee through October 1998. The Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Book Award is presented to English-language works published in the year prior to the announcement date. All books published in December 1998 or the first eleven months of 1997 are eligible.

The award is given in two categories: Literature and Nonfiction. Nominations for the Book Award may be made by any individual not affiliated with the publisher of the book being nominated. Authors may not nominate their own works. A brief (and we do mean brief!) statement (30 to 50 words) describing why the book is being nominated must accompany the nomination.

This nomination must be submitted to the Book Award Committee Chair by November 30, 1998 and be postmarked by this date or it can not be accepted. Nominations will be accepted by both regular and electronic mail, as well as by fax.

Highwater, Jamake. The Mythology of Transgression: Homosexuality as Metaphor. Oxford University Press. 1997. \$25.00 (ISBN 0-19-510180-4)

Jamake Highwater, a disciple of Joseph Campbell and author of *The Myth and Sexuality* (NAL, 1990), offers here an exploration of homosexuality in the context of what he terms "the mythology of transgression". In so doing, he makes a very sound case for viewing homosexuals as transgressors or "aliens", who should be seen, as well as see themselves, as gifted and natural, rather than as sinners and unnatural. That's the good news of this book.

Mr Highwater's uses his own story to set the stage for this complex journey. His experiences as an orphan, Native American, and homosexual are used to illustrate how his ignorance, as it were, to any inkling that these things were bad or wrong allowed him to celebrate his special-ness and cultivate his own unique qualities. The fact that he was able to sustain himself as an "outsider on the inside" with comfort is not common, but it's also not unique. Folklore and legends often use the hero's transgression as a means to greater insight, a point the book uses often.

Beginning with an explanation of human-kind's societal need to protect or wall itself off from the outsider, Mr Highwater continues to show the inevitable outcome of such instincts when religion and then science are used to substantiate them. By creating and using myths to illustrate their need to control, not inspire, Western society is ultimately charged with breeding homophobia for no other reason than its own protection.

As the book progresses, it is made increasingly clear that the mythologies created centuries ago to support patriarchal agendas no longer work today. According to Highwater, the term homosexuality was actually invented. Now there was a suitable label for the sexual transgressor, and as if by magic, homosexuality became debated, analyzed and eventually vilified.

Although the book gets bogged down at times in the author's scholarly synthesis of centuries of research and opinion, his thesis and conclusions are compelling enough to make it an important addition to the gay studies genre.

Incidentally, even though this is not promoted as a self-help guide, the well-researched/positive information contained here should go a long way to bolster anyone's coming-out process. Perhaps the slogan "Transgression is Power" will be a new call to arms.

Recommended for most public and academic libraries.

Naomi Holoch. *Offseason: a novel.*
Falper and Baber, 1997. \$23.95 cloth
(ISBN 0-571-19922-4)

In this first novel the author uses her extensive knowledge of Paris to create a setting that is as richly detailed as her characters are complex. Central to the novel is Miriam's love, which frequently seems almost obsessive, for Gabriella. During Miriam's seven-day visit to Paris, she is allowed beyond the boundaries that had existed throughout the many years of their friendship and the dynamics between them are changed. Initially it appears that Miriam's devotion will finally be rewarded; however, she ultimately learns the importance of letting go.

Highly recommended for fiction collections in larger public libraries and universities, as well as personal collections.

Lynn Kanter. *The Mayor of Heaven.*
Third Side Press, 1998. \$22.95 cloth
(ISBN 1-879427-29-X cloth; 1-879427-30-3 paper)

A novel about loss—the death of a loved partner and friend seems as if it ought to be depressing. Yet, as Claire Morgenstern's four close friends each remember her and deal with their grief we watch them learn to go beyond the initial emptiness they feel at her death.

Lucy, Claire's partner, refuses to be rushed through grief and insists on taking time to acknowledge death and the daily changes that Claire's absence has brought. Anyone who has ever wondered at what to say to someone whose loved one has died, anyone who has lost someone they loved will make a connection to this novel.

Enthusiastically recommended for all fiction collections for adult readers.

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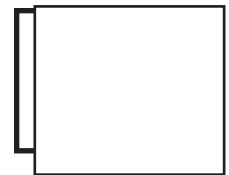
